In 1999 Frank DeSocio and John Crum gave us the opportunity to buy Flint Hills Lanes in Emporia on the courthouse steps. Together In 2001 we purchased Olympia Lanes in St. Joe, Missouri, and in 2002 we also purchased All Star Lanes in Salina, KS. We have sold all of those centers.

In 2010 Ol' Mar and I purchased Ranch West Bowl in Kansas City, KS from Becky and Bob Johannes. We renamed it KC Bowl. We still own this center and as long as our warranty stays in effect (Bob) and Rita keeps us in line, we will continue.

It has been a pleasure to serve on KSBPA committees and to climb the ranks from Sergeant of Arms to President in 2000-2002. I am honored and humbled to be inducted in this Hall of Fame along with all the members who made this organization great. All the friendships and memories we have together are priceless.
